II. Living in El Paso: Just give me the facts!

Our community:

- ❖ Size: We are the 6th largest city in Texas, the largest border town, and the 21st largest city in America
- ❖ Location: We are in the far western corner of Texas, where Texas, New Mexico and Mexico meet
- ❖ Population: There are about 700,000 people living in El Paso and more than 24,000 soldiers and family members. This number is growing !
- ❖ Weather: Be sure to pack your sunglasses, sunscreen, and shorts and leave the winter coats in storage - unless you plan to drive the short 2 hours to the mountains. In the summer expect the temperature to be right around 95 degrees, sometimes higher, but 95 is about the average. Average winter temps are around 55-60 degrees.
- ❖ Time: We are on Mountain Time so we are 2 hours behind the east coast and 1 hour ahead of the west coast.

Interesting....

- ❖ The Spanish originally named this area "El Paso del Norte" or "Pass of the North".
- ❖ The Franklin Mountains, which divide El Paso, are the last southern ridge of the Rocky Mountains.
- ❖ El Paso is located in the Chihuahuan Desert, one of the largest desert areas in the world.
- ❖ The oldest road in the United States, the "Camino Real" or "King's Highway" leads through El Paso, once the Spanish conquistadors traveled north along this road on their search for gold and land.
- ❖ Billy the Kid, Pancho Villa, and John Wesley Hardin all roamed the area
- ❖ There are 15 museums on Fort Bliss and in El Paso.
- ❖ We are home to the El Paso Diablo's Baseball Team, UTEP collegiate sports, and Rhinos Hockey.

IV. Things to DO: School/Clubs

There are 9 school districts in El Paso. Most military students attend El Paso ISD, Ysleta ISD, Socorro ISD or Canutillo ISD because they are the closest to Fort Bliss.

All of the school districts, except Socorro ISD, have a regular school calendar. Socorro is a year round school.

Your house address will determine which school you'll be attending. Some elementary and middle schools have a dress code so be sure to ask.



Depending on which school you attend you'll be able to pick from many different clubs and activities including sports, fine arts, academic clubs, dance, ROTC, Future Business Leaders of America, DECA, Student Council, Newspaper, Yearbook, Speech and Debate, Anime, Destination Imagination, Student 2 Student, you get the idea...there's lots to get involved in.

If you don't know, a Magnet Program is a school within a school which offers specialized courses and curriculum. You still get your regular classes but you also get classes in a special area. Some of the Magnet Programs in El Paso are: Pre-Engineering, Health Sciences, International Business, International Baccalaureate Program, Criminal Justice/Public Service, Culinary Arts, and many more.

If that is not enough, the school districts also offer Early College High School Programs. With a series of rigorous course work and specialized curriculum, students who attend Early College High Schools will graduation with both a High School Diploma and an Associates Degree.

A night with the Diablo's at Cohen Stadium is never dull. The season runs from April through August and military get in free during Military Appreciation Nights.

Like biking? You can choose from Sun City BMX Racing Track, Crazy Cat Mountain Biking, or biking with the family and friends.

Hiking in the desert? Of course! There are literally hundreds of hiking trails in and around El Paso.

Like history, museums, culture? We have science, art, firefighters, Holocaust, archeology, history, railroad, military, Border Patrol, and history museums and that's just to mention a few. You can experience our diverse culture by attending some of the many activities and annual events both on Fort Bliss and in El Paso.

Don't mind driving a little? Then convince your parents to take you on a day, or weekend, trip. Carlsbad Cavers is one of the world's largest underground chambers. V. Education – Middle and High School

Middle Schools: If you live on Fort Bliss you will probably be zoned for either Bassett Middle or Ross Middle. Both have a dress code.

- ❖ Bassett: Shirt: polo style or t-shirt - white or maroon with school logo
Pants: Khaki with no brand name (no cargo style)
- ❖ Ross: Shirt: polo style - white or hunter green
Pants: Khaki or navy (skirts, shorts, and skorts are allowed)

Other Middle Schools surrounding Fort Bliss are: Canyon Hills, Charles, MacArthur, Nolan Richardson, and Terrace Hills.

High Schools: If you live on Fort Bliss you will probably be zoned for either Chapin High or Austin High. Neither have a dress code.

Other High Schools surrounding Fort Bliss are: Burgess, Irvin and Andress.

Bell Schedule:

Middle School: 0750 - 1450

High School: 0845 - 1545

Graduation Requirements:

Students can choose between the Recommended High School Program (RHSP) or the Distinguished Achievement High School Program (DAP).

RHSP: Students must earn at least 24 credits in the following areas. Students entering High School during the 2008/9 school year must earn at least 26 credits, 1 additional credit in both Math and Science:

- ❖ 4 in English
- ❖ 3 in Math: Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II (a 4th Math credit is required if entering HS in the 08/09 school year)

V. Education – Middle and High School

- ❖ 3 in Science: IPC, Biology, Chemistry, or Physics (Principles of Technology can substitute Physics) (a 4th Science credit is required if entering HS in the 08/09 school year)
- ❖ 3.5 in Social Studies: World Geography, World History, United States History, United States Government
- ❖ .5 in Economics
- ❖ 1.5 in Physical Education
- ❖ .5 in Health
- ❖ .5 in Speech
- ❖ 1.0 in Technology Applications
- ❖ 1.0 in Fine Arts
- ❖ 2.0 in Languages other than English (must be the same language)
- ❖ 3.5 in Electives

The DAP requires the same course requirement as the RHSP with: One (1) additional credit of a language other than English (for a total of three (3) credits). Students must also achieve an additional combination of **four** specific advanced measures. Contact your school counselor if you want more information about DAP.

V. Education - College

The Middle School and Teen Center's Teen Lounge is full of college information, applications, brochures, computers, and everything you need to make a decision about college.

There is also SAT/ACT/PSAT prep course software loaded on the computers.

Getting ready for college begins as soon as you enter high school. Remember, grades that determine your GPA begin in the 9th grade.

Juniors:

- ❖ Enroll in pre-AP and AP courses
- ❖ Start thinking about where you want to go to college and talk to your parents about your choices. Remember, college is expensive and you will pay more for out of state schools
- ❖ If your schedule allows and the course is offered at your school you should take an SAT/PSAT/ACT prep course
- ❖ Request college applications and visit campuses if possible
- ❖ Get letters of recommendation
- ❖ Identify scholarship opportunities
- ❖ Participate in and record community service/volunteer work

Seniors:

- ❖ Continue to do what you were doing as a Junior but you'll have added responsibilities
- ❖ Take the SAT or ACT, or both
- ❖ Narrow your college choices
- ❖ Submit college and scholarship applications. A deadline is a deadline
- ❖ Complete financial aid paperwork
